His book, *No More Stolen Childhoods*, has received notable acclaim as a relevant documentation of an adult survivor's personal journey overcoming deep emotional and physical scarring. His speeches are thoughtful and dynamic, inviting listeners to make their own pledge to protect and preserve the innocence and purity of young people through education and outreach.

SESSION: A5

The Best Kept Secret: Mother/ Daughter Incest

Mother-daughter sexual abuse is especially under-recognized, under-researched and under-reported. This workshop describes the complex mother-daughter incestuous relationship—the subtle, yet intentional violations of normal mother-child boundaries, covert and overt abuse and the psychological manipulations used to silence victims. Attendees will learn ways to include mothers as potential perpetrators in prevention programs and in sexual abuse investigations. Six key therapeutic issues for recovery will be discussed. The program will conclude with a discussion of the shared dynamics and also the differences between mother-daughter and mother-son incest. The presenter is both an experienced counselor and a resilient survivor of maternal abuse.

SESSION: A6

Sentencing the Final Frontier...or is It?

Use of Polygraph in Child Abuse Investigations

The use of polygraph or "lie detector" as people often refer to it, was primarily designed to be a scientific aid to interrogation. The results of a polygraph test are by no means conclusive evidence, but admissions and confessions obtained as a result of a polygraph examination are. This workshop will discuss the valuable role of a criminal polygraph examiner in child abuse investigations and how they can be utilized. Case examples will be discussed.

SESSION: B4

No More Stolen Childhoods: A Journey of Healing

As a survivor of childhood sexual abuse, No More Stolen Childhoods founder, D. Wayne Coffey, understands the profound hardships victims of abuse face, not only as children but also as adults. Wayne will speak about the powerful effects of holistic healing and how these alternative therapies have helped him to become a stronger, healthier person.

SESSION: C1

Forensic Evidence In Child and Adolescent Sexual Assault

PRESENTED BY: *Dr. Allan DeJong*

This workshop will discuss the science and rationale behind collection and interpretation of forensic evidence in

acute child and adolescent sexual assault. Discussion will include the major types of forensic evidence, appropriate screening procedures, and differences in the approach to prepubescent children and adolescents. The workshop is appropriate for medical and multidisciplinary audiences.

SESSION: C2

Resiliency 101: From Victim to Survivor

PRESENTED BY: *Julie Brand*

Some victims of childhood abuse perpetuate the cycle; others grow to be safe, nurturing adults. This workshop identifies seven key steps to becoming a resilient survivor—steps that can help a

victim to overcome trauma and to develop a “survivor’s perspective.” Attendees will learn how to use the “language of resiliency” to identify and reinforce victims’ strengths, positively impacting their self-perceptions. The presenter is both an experienced counselor and a resilient survivor of maternal sexual abuse.

SESSION: C3

Preparing For and Reacting to Victim Recantation: A Case Study

PRESENTED BY: Amy O’Campo & Diane Conaway

This workshop will focus on preparing for and reacting to victim recantation. Participants will hear from an assistant state’s attorney and corporal as they discuss a case study about a 10 year old girl, who recanted her story.

SESSION: C4

How Long Does it Hurt?

PRESENTED BY: Cynthia Mather

Helping a child or teen deal with the impact of sexual abuse and incest is a big job. It can be difficult to know where to start and how to determine the most pressing issues. Using Dr. David Finkelhor’s mode of the four Traumatic Dynamics, this workshop will help individuals working with children and teens better understand the impact, the long term effects, and where to begin. There will be opportunity to ask questions to Ms. Mather who is a survivor of incest.

SESSION: C5

Sexual Assaults Involving Drugs & Alcohol

PRESENTED BY: Sgt. Dave Betz & Lt. Carl Brooks

Though drugs and alcohol do not cause sexual offenses to occur, they are often involved in sexual assaults. Numerous studies have shown a correlation between the use of drugs and alcohol and the frequency of sexual assault. These studies have shown that drug and alcohol use may alleviate the offender of his

inhibitions against acting on his motivation to engage in sexual assault. Learning to recognize these indicators may provide an invaluable asset to understanding the possible motivations of the suspect and the possible impaired conditions of the victim.

SESSION: C6

Sex Trafficking of a Minor

PRESENTED BY: Det. Thomas Stack

This block of instruction dispels the image of prostitution as a “victimless crime”. The trainer will go over how and why many children become involved in prostitution. How their upbringing and life styles make them vulnerable to pimps, especially runaways. I explain how pimps select girls to target and recruit for prostitution and how they keep them there. You will learn to search the internet for child victims and how cooperation between local and federal law enforcement is a must. You will learn how to interview the victims to get them to disclose their pimps and how to get the victims the help that they need through cooperation with NGO’s. A case review will be discussed.

SESSION: C7

Care & Feeding of the Board of Directors

PRESENTED BY: Yvette Kubick

The turnover rate for CAC Executive Directors is alarmingly high. This can be attributed to a number of factors including inadequate funding, lack of peer support, and burnout from wearing too many “hats”, and one of the biggest factors: a poor relationship with the board of directors. This workshop will strengthen the participant’s knowledge of board roles and responsibilities, and help them learn effective ground rules for healthy Board-Executive Director relationships.

SESSION: D1

Medical Child Abuse: Call it Munchausen, Call it Factitious Disorder or Whatever...

But Call it Abuse

PRESENTED BY: Dr. Allan DeJong

This workshop will explore the evolving concept of medical child abuse or child abuse in the medical setting and the rationale for using this term to replace “Munchausen syndrome by proxy”, factitious disorder by proxy and other terms. Discussion will include a series of cases to explore clinical presentations, evaluation strategies, and management. The workshop is appropriate for medical and multidisciplinary audiences.

SESSION: D2

Who Are These Children and How Can We Rescue Them

PRESENTED BY: Melissa Stroebel

This session will explain the efforts of NCMEC’s Child Victim Identification Program to rescue unidentified sexually exploited children and CVIP resources available to laws enforcement officials. There will be several illustrations of how child victims depicted in child pornography have been identified all over the world, and various investigative strategies will be presented to aid in the identification of unknown child victims. Participants will learn statistics such as the age of the child victims seen in these abusive images, the relationship of the abuser to child victim and how many abusers use child pornography collections as a form of blackmail to silence the victim. Many children never disclose the fact that they were pornographically photographed so it is more important than ever that all law enforcement professionals are familiar with the exploding problem of child pornography circulating on the Internet.

SESSION: D3

Adult Survivors of Sexual Childhood Abuse

PRESENTED BY: Kevin Urick & Anne Bean

A multidisciplinary presentation of the difficulties adult survivors of childhood

sexual abuse face when they finally come forward, disclose and must deal with personal trauma while interacting with an often unsupportive legal system. This presentation will provide valuable strategies of use to adult survivors as well as service providers and investigators who come into contact with them.

SESSION: D4

Conflicted Loyalties: Working with Families Where Sibling Incest Occurred

PRESENTED BY: *Kevin Wade*

Addressing the dynamics that exist within a family where sex abuse has occurred specifically focusing on the relationship between the non-offending parent and the offender.

SESSION: D5

Juvenile Sex Offenders

PRESENTED BY: *Allison Turkel*

When the sex offender is himself or herself a child, the system and society have difficulty sorting out the complex issues involved. Due to these complexities and the fluid ever changing nature of the juvenile justice system, there is usually a lack of consensus on how to adequately handle juvenile sex offenders. As result, police and prosecutors have difficulty deciding how to appropriately investigate and prosecute these offenders. Investigation and prosecution issues particular to juvenile offenders will be addressed in this workshop. Prosecutorial and investigative tactics as well as treatment considerations will be discussed.

SESSION: D6

Internet Prostitution

PRESENTED BY: *Det. Thomas Stack*

This block of instruction covers the increase in prostitution on the internet. The internet has fast become the modern day “track” or prostitution strip. This presentation will cover most of the common websites used for advertising prostitution. You will learn how to deci-

pher the lingo used online to communicate between the prostitute and the client. It will cover some the investigative techniques used to surf the web faster and more efficiently.

SESSION: D7

Preparing the Child Witness: Skill Building, Best Practices, and Resources

PRESENTED BY: *Joddie Walker*

The work of Child Advocacy Centers is a significant step towards minimizing systemic trauma. Child Advocacy Centers provide a multi-disciplinary approach towards child abuse victims, with dedication to reducing the secondary victimization many children experience. One example of secondary victimization is being subpoenaed into courtrooms with the expectation to provide full and accurate accounts of the abuse they suffered or the violence they have witnessed. This expectation imposes stressors on children that even adult witnesses find challenging. Having worked with hundreds of child witnesses, the value of court preparation has proven to be beneficial for the children required to testify in a courtroom. Through experience and research, it is clear that those children who had the benefit of a preparation program were less fearful, more prepared and testified with greater ease.

SESSION: E1

Victim Advocate Training

Whether you are a director, a victim advocate or any other member of the MDT, advocacy can take shape in many ways and will present differently on any given day. This presenter has over 12 years of experience working as a victim advocate within the criminal justice system. She has performed various agency roles in the front line and administration as well as worked in multiple states and in two different countries. Learn how she feels stronger than ever

in her conviction to be the voice of the powerless, thus defining her meaning of the word-advocate. This workshop discusses the complex areas of this role as it relates to confidentiality, victim's rights, crisis intervention, intake and assessment, victim education, court accompaniment and victim program standards. Through antidotal stories and research, you will learn how to be the best possible advocate for your clients.

SESSION: E2

Sex Offender Notification Act Under the Adam Walsh Child Protection Act

There will be an overview of the Title 1 of the Adam Walsh Act. This presentation will detail the statute, the final guidelines issued by the Department of Justice and the applicability to the states and other jurisdictions.

SESSION: E3

This workshop will detail how the law enforcement authorities in a Maryland county structure their office and their cases to streamline investigations to effectively utilize the resources of federal law enforcement authorities. Some of the benefits include longer sentences, less trials, and better cases. And most importantly, with less trials the added benefit is that the child victim would not have to testify.

Working with Non-Offending Caregivers

This workshop focuses on working with non-offending caregivers of child & adolescent trauma. This will be both experiential and didactic. Facilitator and members of the Cecil County CAC Non-Offending Caregivers group will present and discuss with audience members, the structure of group and their own personal experiences beginning with disclosure, through investigation, legal process. It is imperative that, after trauma occurs, the health and well being of the child victim be thoroughly supported and treated, but taking care of their non-offending caregivers is key. This is a very candid and personal experience for the caregivers who will speak with the audience. Their willingness and insight will teach all who are present. Segments of the presentation will be interactive to assist the attendees understanding of the dynamics and obstacles facing the Non-Offending Caregivers

while they work with the multiple systems during and after an investigation.

SESSION: E7

Devil Is In the Details

Join Dayle Hinman this year again as she discusses more cases from her toolbox that will allow the participant to see how a case is investigated. Dayle was formally trained in criminal profiling at the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Behavioral Science Unit at Quantico, Virginia. She has successfully investigated hundreds of crimes perpetrated by murderers, rapists and sexual offenders including serial killers, Aileen Wuornos, Danny Rolling, Rory Conde, Francisco del Junco, and Ted Bundy. She is a court certified expert in Crime Scene Assessment and lectures nationally and internationally on Criminal Profiling, Crime Scene Analysis, Threat Assessment and Serial Offenders. Come see her as she pulls more cases that are bound to intrigue as well as give us an inside look on how you can improve your investigation techniques.

The Mystery of the Safe Exam Unraveled: The Acute vs. The Chronic

Medical Evaluation of Child Physical Abuse

Participants will learn about common abusive and non-abusive injury patterns and how to know if the evaluating physician has done a thorough evaluation.

SESSION: G2

Interviewing Children With Special Needs

This workshop is intended for all levels of professionals who are involved in the investigation and prosecution of child abuse cases involving children with special needs. This is a special population requiring special considerations for effectively intervening in these cases. Based upon both practical and personal experience, this workshop will engage participants in a wide-ranging discussion on how we can best meet the needs of those clients who are at the greatest risk for harm

SESSION G3

Sharing Survival

Join Danielle as she shares her personal experience of victimization and survival. In 2000, Danielle was kidnapped, raped, and shot by a stranger. and the media, the effect of her victimization on her family and community, and the differences in healing from a rape versus a shooting.

Say What

Are you actively listening to me? People need and want to be heard! Active listening allows and encourages a person to freely communicate his/her needs, opinions, and desires. By understanding the other person's point of view, you build and establish trust. Listening actively is a way of saying that you accept how the other person sees the world at that moment in time. Actively listening takes practice and requires constructing a new habit, easier said than done. This program will discuss what it means to actively listen, not only to the listener but the speaker as well. Characteristics and traits of an active listener will be discussed so that participants can begin and understand how to actively listen. Lecture and exercises will be utilized during this presentation.

Keeping Children Safe While in Care

A workshop specifically designed for the special needs of this population. This session will address the safety issues of abduction, exploitation, runaway and throwaway children in out-of-home care. Information about children who runaway and the effect trauma has on child development. It will look at the importance of visitation as well as the commonalities of parents who abduct their children. Parenting tips and resources will be shared. This workshop utilizes a variety of presenta-

tion styles including lecture, video, and open discussion and is appropriate for those new to the field as well as those with experience.

Munchausen By Proxy: A Case Study

My Daddy Didn't Shake Me Someone Else Did

This Workshop will focus on 2 fathers who have been victims of SBS (abusive head trauma) meaning their babies were shaken by caregiver. Share their stories of moving from tragedy to triumph. Both are now activist for the prevention of abusive head trauma in childhood.

How to Start a Juvenile Sex Offender Treatment Group

This Workshop will focus on all aspects involved in starting a juvenile sex offending treatment group in a local jurisdiction. Topics covered will include identifying the need for such a program, soliciting and maintaining community support and involvement, fundraising and program design. This workshop will explore unforeseen barriers that may arise throughout the process and examine effective market-

ing techniques. The presenter will discuss the need for successful outreach and education as well as helpful outcome measures. The pros and cons associated with successful implementation of a program will also be discussed.

Lights, Camera, Action

Public speaking is a common source of stress for everyone. Many of us would like to avoid this problem entirely, but this is hard to do. the hidden causes of public speaking stress, you can overcome this fear.

PLENARY SESSION

Vicarious Trauma

PRESENTED BY: *Dr. Sarah Hallet*

This presentation will discuss how to prevent vicarious trauma in the workplace and how to take care of yourself as a professional. Dr. Hallet uses comedy to help people learn to value they what do while creating boundaries so that it does not take over your personal life physically, emotionally or intellectually. Dr. Hallet has provided extensive critical incident services for NYPD and FDNY personnel in the aftermath of the terrorist attacks at the World Trade Centers. She spent over 9 weeks at Ground Zero providing these services. She was featured in the book, "Women at Ground Zero: Stories of Courage and Compassion."
